The Way of the Cross

During Lent many people walk and pray the way of the cross (aka the Stations of the Cross.) That devotion, as well as today's liturgy and scriptures, are meant to be a rehearsal for us. Every disciple of Jesus is called to follow him on the way of the cross. It's not that only Christians encounter crosses. Suffering and death are an unavoidable part of being human. Even the wealthy encounter false accusations, power struggles, and moral dilemmas, as Jesus did. All who take the risk of loving also risk being disappointed, betrayed, and abandoned, as Jesus was. Everyone will experience anguish, pity, and finally, death. We don't really have a choice about suffering. The choice we have is how we will suffer the trials of life. Will we follow Jesus' way of innocence, loving service, forgiveness, and courage? If we do, we will discover that the way of discipleship is the way to eternal life.

Holy Week*

Palm Sunday is only the beginning of our week-long liturgical celebration of the way of discipleship. The liturgies of Holy Week recall the events that revealed both the depth of God's love for humankind and the way to eternal life. On Holy Thursday we ritually recommit ourselves to following Jesus' way of loving service. On Good Friday we reclaim the gift of Jesus' life for us and join our prayers with his for the salvation of the world. On Holy Saturday we remember God's work of creation and redemption, with an emphasis on the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Then we participate in the sacraments that join us to new life in Christ: baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist. At last, on Easter Sunday we rejoice in the new and eternal life that flows from following Christ—the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

Good Friday Collection

Fasting Rules for Good Friday

On Good Friday, Catholics age 18 to 59 do not eat meat, and limit the amount of food they eat. Instead of meat you may eat fish. Only one full meal, and two smaller meals that together do not equal a full meal, are eaten. The best rule of thumb is to make sure your meals are smaller than what you would eat on a normal day, and to avoid snacks. Exemption is allowed for pregnant women and those who need regular meals for medical reasons.

You have heard the words "fasting" and "abstinence" used when talking about Lent. "Fasting" is the word used when the amount of food eaten is limited. "Abstinence" is when you completely give something up, like meat, for a set period of time. Both "fasting" and "abstinence" play a role on Good Friday.

Treasures From Our Tradition

What day is today? Ask most folks strolling home from church today and they will reply "Palm Sunday." Not too long ago, today was known as the "Second Sunday of the Passion," and in 1970 it was renamed "Passion Sunday." This makes some sense, since the procession recalling Christ's entry into Jerusalem is usually only celebrated once in a parish on this day, but the Passion is proclaimed solemnly at every liturgy. In the United States today, most worshippers are provided with palm branches, although in northern Europe pussy willows are favored, and in Italy olive branches are the norm.

When our calendar was reformed, the entire structure of the week to come was revised and given a new name, "Passion Week." Most people cling to the older name, "Holy Week," the last few days of the Lenten journey. The major benefit of the restructuring of our calendar is to help us see that the Triduum, the great three days beginning at sunset this Thursday and extending until sunset on Easter Sunday, is at the heart of the Christian life.

Today, as you ponder the Lord's Passion, you may consider your response to so great a gift. Centuries ago, good Christians vowed to go on pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Today, at least once in your lifetime, promise to participate faithfully in the liturgies. Now begins the Church's annual baptismal retreat: don't be left out!
